A Journey Through Psalms 119





Dear Friend,

I am glad that you are desiring to read and journal through Psalm 119. This Psalm is unique because it provides a lengthy meditation on the Scripture itself. By far the longest of the Psalms, Psalm 119 is composed as an acrostic poem in which each line of each stanza begins with the same letter of the Hebrew alphabet. The acrostic provides a beautiful poetic structure that is lost in our English translation. The structure communicates the author's intent to give us a full A to Z contemplation of the wonder of God's word.

It is worth noting that in the Bible God offers his most comprehensive description of Scripture through poetry and not prose. Composed for singing, the Psalms inform our minds but also stir our affections. Through Psalm 119, God wants us to know something about his word, and he also wants us to feel something about his word. In his book Bible Delight, Christopher Ash says the following about Psalm 119:

"For the Psalms perfectly combine thought and feeling, theology and prayer, emotion and reality, the subjective and the objective. In particular, Psalm 119 can inject into the heartbeat of Christian experience the passionate and reasonable delight in the written word of God." (p. 13)

This is my prayer for all of us as we journey through Psalm 119 together: that we may both think and feel rightly about God's word so that we will better know, enjoy and serve our Lord.

his study is broken up into 22 entries corresponding to the 22 stanzas of Psalm 119. I suggest you read and respond to one section per day. We will be studying the Psalm for 30 days, so if you miss a day or a few days, no worries. It will be easy to jump back in and finish on time. May God reveal himself to you through this wonderful Psalm, and may he transform you as you look to him!




